


Principal's Message

Mr. Dean MacInnis

I cannot express how great it is to see students in the hallways of Sir John. We have come to the end of our first month back and we have learned a tremendous amount about how school is functioning under these new guidelines. The measures that we have put in place are to ensure all students and staff are safe, as this remains our top priority. When we put together our returning to school plan it was without students in the building, thus we will be continuously reflecting and adjusting protocols throughout the semester.

In some classrooms, students will be able to have the proper distance without requiring a mask, but may need to wear it when interacting with staff and other students. When eating, drinking and outdoors, masks are not required. In smaller rooms and classes with more students where we are unable to have the needed distance between students, we will need those students in these situations to wear masks in class.


Re: Passing of beloved high school teacher Maureen Tonge

To all staff, students, parents/guardians and stakeholders:

It is with great sadness that we inform you of the passing of longtime high school teacher Maureen Tonge, who passed away earlier today. Maureen, who most recently taught Fine Arts at École Sir John Franklin High School, lost a courageous battle with cancer surrounded by family and friends.

Originally from New Brunswick, Maureen taught art, yoga, fitness, career and life management and French at the high school between 1992 and 2019. She also spearheaded the school's "Leaving a Legacy" project in which students create portraits of notable Northerners, including Indigenous leaders, educators and Sir John alumni.

Maureen had a larger than life personality that left an impression on everyone who met her. Following a devastating diagnosis, Maureen chose to live out her remaining days doing what she loved and spreading positivity. She will always be remembered for her infectious enthusiasm and zest for life.



Maureen leaves behind her husband, step children, sisters, parents and dog. We would like to extend our sincerest condolences to all of her family, friends and students. She will be greatly missed.







ORANGE SHIRT DAY

Cleaning and disposing of non-medical masks and face coverings

Cloth masks or face coverings should be changed and cleaned if they become damp or soiled.

You can wash your cloth mask by:

- putting it directly into the washing machine, using a hot cycle, and then dry thoroughly
- washing it thoroughly by hand if a washing machine is not available, using soap and warm/hot water
- allow it to dry completely before wearing it again



Non-medical masks that cannot be washed should be disposed of properly in a lined garbage bin, and replaced as soon as they get damp, soiled or crumpled. Do not leave discarded masks in shopping carts or on the ground where other people may come into contact with them.

It is important to remember the following when using non-medical masks and face coverings:

- masks with an exhalation valve do not protect others
- never share your non-medical mask or face covering with someone else
- do not handle a non-medical mask or face covering belonging to someone else
- do not allow other people to handle or touch your non-medical mask or face covering
