



Ms. Waugh's Grade 8 science class dissects a moose heart


Ms. Waugh's grade 8 students experienced a moose heart dissection where science met culture! Students not only observed the dissection but were given a hands-on approach to learning. Donning rubber gloves students were able to get in and feel how all the parts of the heart are connected as they learned about pumps, valves, anatomy and how the circulatory system works.

Students were also taught about traditional sustenance hunting and traditional tools used by northern indigenous peoples. Students were happy to have the opportunity to share how their own families live off the land. Ms. Waugh is excited for a year of hands-on learning where her class can bridge traditional knowledge and classroom curriculum.

October 11th is National Coming Out Day in Canada and the US, a day to celebrate the lesbian, gay, bisexual, trans, queer, and questioning (LGBTQ) members of our communities. This day was started in 1988 by Rob Eichberg and Jean O'Leary in celebration of the second March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights on October 11, 1987. In the 1980s, when many people did not know any openly LGBT2Q+ people, ignorance and silence allowed homophobia to persist. Coming out was a form of activism and it was believed that when people realized they knew someone who was LGBT2Q+, they would be far more likely to support equality under the law.

'Coming out', the expression used to describe the social acknowledgement of one's sexual orientation or gender identity, is a deeply personal process, and often intensely emotional. It should be noted that modern LGBT2Q+ activists believe that the idea of "coming out" reinforces a view that heterosexuality is the norm. "Coming out" implicitly announces — to LGBTQ individuals, allies and enemies — that queer people are aberrant. There has additionally been growing acknowledgement that for many members of our Queer community, this places undue pressure on folks who are not in a safe country or circumstances to 'come out'.

But coming out is not a safe option for all Canadians. According to Statistics Canada, hate crimes targeting sexual orientation accounted for 64% of all hate crimes in 2018, and crimes against this population were more likely to be violent than non-violent.

The situation is just as dire in Canadian schools. Egale Canada's Every Class in Every School: The first national climate survey on homophobia, biphobia, and transphobia in Canadian schools, notes that "two thirds of lesbian, gay, bisexual, trans, two-spirited, queer and questioning students felt unsafe at school" where "51% of LGBTQ students have been verbally harassed about their sexual orientation and 21% have been physically harassed or assaulted about their sexual orientation." These numbers were even higher for trans youth, 74% of whom faced verbal harassment, and 37% of whom were physically harassed or assaulted about their gender. All this, combined with the risks of being abandoned by one's family and community, rejected by religious groups, and, in over 70 countries worldwide, having one's rights curtailed and identity criminalized by the state, means that coming out is simply not possible for many LGBTQ individuals. Clearly work remains to be done.

National Coming Out Day serves as an excellent opportunity for all Canadians, regardless of their sexual orientation or gender identity, to acknowledge everyone's role in making our communities safer and more welcoming for LGBTQ individuals.





OCTOBER to DECEMBER


Student Council News

Kaitlyn Taylor Candy Gram Fundraiser


On August 30, 2020, Kaitlyn Taylor, a 19-year-old St. Pat's graduate was in a devastating car accident on Highway 3 near Behchokǫ. Later that same day, she was medevaced to Edmonton in critical condition with the full extent of her injuries unknown.

In an update from the beginning of October 2020, it is said that Kaitlyn and her mother will have to remain in Edmonton for at least 3-6 more months, if not longer, to continue to receive rehabilitation and treatment. Student Council believed it was important to support this local family in a time of crisis, thus we decided to run a candy gram fundraiser.

This fundraiser ended up being quite successful, with a total of \$359.05 raised to donate to the Taylor family. We would like to thank everyone who participated in this fundraiser through buying a candy gram or donating; without you, this fundraiser would not have been a success.

YK1 Staff Spotlight


Maureen Tonge
