

Chemistry 30 is building cells!

Each cell is composed of two half-cells, a metal electrode in its own ion solution. The difference between the two metals creates a competition for electrons and this is what produces the voltage. Change the half-cell combination, and you will produce different voltages. Here Ms. Prescott's Chem 30 class was using copper (blue), zinc (clear), nickel (green), and dichromate (orange).












Sir John students help create Pride Guide

Hillary Huynh won gold in all three categories she played: Singles, doubles with Elaine Cronk and mixed doubles with Nathan Cluff.







Your Child's Development: Music Study may be the Best Tool


