
Chemistry is alive and well at SJF!

Students practiced their skills using pipettes, electronic balances, and volumetric flasks.



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

work hard so office staff don't have to be running around doing work that would take them out of their offices for a morning or an afternoon. I'm grateful we got to be part of it for a day."


Take Our Kids to Work Day




Grade 8 STEM Hydraulics Project

8G & 8L Science class(s) recently completed their Unit on 'Mix of Flow and Matter' to apply their knowledge of 'Compression' (Pascal's Law), 'Particle Model of Matter', and 'Fluids and Technology'. Students were tasked to build a prototype of an existing invention that used hydraulics. Household items were used in this STEM experiment to apply their learning to our unit.

Students used syringes, hydraulic lines (rubber hoses), cardboard and various art supplies to create scissors lifts, hydraulic plows, elevators, excavator(s), a prosthetic hand, and many other hydraulic inventions to apply their learning. Students did a spectacular job on rising to the task and many great projects were created!







What is Transgender Awareness Week?

Transgender Awareness Week (November 13-19) is a week when transgender people and their allies take action to bring attention to the community by educating the public about who transgender people are, sharing stories and experiences, and advancing advocacy around the issues of prejudice, discrimination, and violence that affect the transgender community.

Transgender Day of Remembrance

TDOR is an annual observance on November 20 that honours the memory of the transgender people whose lives were lost in acts of anti-transgender violence that year. 2021 marks the most deadly year on record, with 375 deaths globally. Most of the murders happen in Central and South America (70%), but cases have been reported from Greece, Kazakhstan, and Malawi for the first time this year. 25% were murdered in their own homes. 96% were trans women or transfeminine people.

How to be an Ally to Transgender People

The following are tips that can be used as you move toward becoming a better ally to transgender people. Of course, this list is not exhaustive and cannot include all the "right" things to do or say because often there is no one "right" answer to every situation you might encounter. When you become an ally of transgender people, your actions will help change the culture, making

society a better, safer place for transgender people and for all people (trans or not) who do not conform to conventional gender expectations. For more explanation of each of the following points, go to https://www.glaad.org/transgender/allies

You can't tell if someone is transgender just by looking.

Don't make assumptions about a transgender person's sexual orientation.

If you don't know what pronouns to use, listen first.

Don't ask a transgender person what their "real name" is.

Be careful about confidentiality, disclosure, and "outing."

Don't ask about a transgender person's genitals, surgical status, or sex life.

Avoid backhanded compliments and "helpful" tips. For instance, comments like "I would have never known you were transgender. You look so pretty," or "Have you considered a voice coach?" Challenge anti-transgender remarks or jokes in public spaces, including LGB spaces.
Support all-gender public restrooms.

Listen to transgender people.

Learn that transgender people are not new. Know your own limits as an ally.

SJF Debate Club

New this year to Sir John's extra-curricular scene is the Debate Club. Born in the deepest part of our Fall lockdown, the club has been meeting regularly for about 12 weeks now, both on Zoom and more recently in person.

Our group is comprised for the most part of grade 8-11 students who meet on Wednesdays for about an hour to debate the merits of various issues of the day. The kids have been working through both the very formal Parliamentary Debate process as well as the less formal Impromptu Debate process. Our group owes a great deal to club co-founders Nicola Langille and Neesha Rao for the tremendous

technical expertise and infectious enthusiasm that they bring to our sessions.

Although the club began with a group of five gritty participants back in October, we are regularly seeing about thirty kids out to our weekly debates in NACC (and we are having a ball). Additionally, we have a small number of grade 8 students preparing for an on-line debate tournament on December 10.

To this point students have debated the following ideas:

- **1.** The Government of Canada should lower the legal voting age to 16;
- 2. The Government of Canada should cease all oil and gas production by 2030;
- **3.** The Government of Canada should develop 'Right to Repair' legislation;
- **4.** The Government of Canada should make blood donation mandatory.

In addition to our two wonderful community volunteers, our club benefits from the work of staff supervisors Hannah Griffin, Chantal Hamel-Bouchard, Tomiko Robson, Kodi Bauldry and Peter Curran.
