

Taking Science Classes Outside in September

In the 2020-2021 school year, teachers explored other options for learning due to COVID. Members of the SJF staff created spaces outside of the school where students could learn in larger groups.

This year, Sir John has two locations for classes to experience learning outside. Science teacher Kim Poitras has used these locations for her science students to engage in labs and activities focused on plant and animals. Students created a "outdoor microscope" to explore and discover microscopic organisms. These experiences show how Science can be "cool"!



Making New Friends and Why Pronouns Matter

A Knowledge Drop from the Gender & Sexuality Squad

Hey, there, You! Hello! Are you new to our school? Are you meeting new friends? Are you asking their pronouns, and sharing your pronouns? That's super!

It's early in the school year, so in case you have forgotten... a pronoun is a word that refers to the people talking (you, I) or to someone or something that is being talked about (she, they, this). Pronouns often have a gender implied, such as "she" for a woman/girl or "he" for a man/boy.

People may make an assumption of which pronouns to use based on someone's name or appearance, BUT making an assumption can unintentionally send a harmful message. It can be offensive or harassing to guess someone's pronouns.

Actively choosing to ignore the pronouns someone has asked you to use for them can send the message that intersex, transgender, nonbinary, and gender nonconforming people do not or should not exist.

And that is NOT how to make new friends!

Instead, ask people			
"What pronouns do you use?"			
"How would you like me to address you?"			
"Could you please remind me of your pronouns?"

Some common pronouns you may have encountered are:

Subject	Object	Possessive
Не	Him	His
She	Her	Hers
They	Them	Their
It	It	Its
Ze (or Zie)	Hir	Hir
Xe	Xem	Xyr
Ey	Em	Eir

These last three rows are examples of **neopronouns**, and can be used for gender neutral or gender nonconforming individuals. Always ask, because some people may not use pronouns and will prefer you to use only their name! If an individual uses dual pronouns, like "she/they" it is generally okay to switch between both sets – but again ASK!

If you make a mistake with someone's pronouns, correct yourself in the next sentence and move on. For example, if you are talking about someone who uses he/him pronouns and you say, "She is a great student. I'm sorry, I meant to say he is a great student." Don't make a big deal about it, but make sure to fix your mistake and do better moving forward.

Never force someone to share their pronouns!

Nothing may be more personal than the words people use to refer to us through our names and pronouns. Using appropriate pronouns is a first step toward respecting people's gender identity and creating a more welcoming space for people of all genders!
